

I'm a lifelong Dolly Parton fan. Even before she helped fund the Moderna vaccine, before she helped strengthen communities of color, before she helped millions of children worldwide to read, before she advocated for women in the workplace, long before any of that.

I trace my love of Dolly back to her "Here You Come Again" album of 1977. My family owned it in 8-track tape format, because we were fancy, and we listened to it on long road trips to the relatives. I must say, 1977 was a phenomenal year: Dolly's album, *Star Wars* (before it became *Star Wars: A New Hope*), and the Apple II was released, but I digress.

Dolly is also an inspirational entrepreneur. I didn't realize that back in 1977, but I so admire her for that today. She created multiple income streams for herself long before that was a thing: singer; songwriter; producer; actress; author; perfume designer; theme park owner; hotelier; spa owner; real estate investor; and more. With more than 3,000 songwriting credits, she knew that her most important asset was her intellectual property and she has fiercely protected it.

In 1974, Dolly composed one of the greatest songs ever written, "I Will Always Love You."

Colonel Tom Parker wanted the song for his famous client, Elvis Presley. He invited Dolly down to the studio to hear Elvis sing it, an experience that brought Dolly to tears.

But there was a catch. Colonel Parker demanded that Dolly give up half of the publishing rights to the song. Dolly refused. In the end, Elvis didn't sing the song, but Whitney Houston did. And sang the heck out of it, in fact. That single recording earned Dolly over \$10 million because she held onto her rights.

Like many songwriters, Dolly wrote about the impact of the pandemic. Her song "When Life Is Good Again" has played in our home many times during this terrible period. But one line has struck me each time, "You want rainbows, you'll get rain."

For me, this newsletter is one such rainbow after the rain. I've missed communicating with you, my friends, family and clients in this way.
